

The paper follows the rubric, including the title page and reference pages. Page/word count is accurate (check rubric).
The abstract gives highlights of each section, is about 100-300 words (typically), and contains no citations.
The introduction hooks the reader and tells what's known (background), what's unknown (the gaps/limitations), and the aim of this study/paper.
The thesis is clear and organized. It's easy to findat the end of the introduction section. It is backed up with quality, cited examples.
The methods and materials section includes who, what, when, where, how, and why. Okay to use jargon and passive voice here.
The results section summarizes the data by pointing out relationships, describing trends, and presenting supporting data.
The tables and graphs stand alone and tell a complete story. Readers should not have to refer to the text to understand these.
The discussion section answers the hypothesis, supports and defends the conclusion, and gives the take-home message.
The discussion section does not introduce new information.
Each paragraph begins with a clear topic sentence and has clear transition sentences.
All quotes and paraphrases are cited. No plagiarism. Each citation has a corresponding bibliography reference.
Examples with citations are used evenly throughout. All in-text citations are properly formatted.
Grammar and spelling are checked and rechecked for mistakes. The paper is easy to follow, organized, and logical.
The paper is formatted correctly: APA, AMA, Chicago, etc. (on rubric) Page numbers are in the right locations. Margines are set properly.
There are enough resources (check rubric!) that are reliable, varied, and properly cited on the reference page.
The due date is on the calendar. You've left time for reviewing this checklist and editing as necessary.
